If we don't care for them, who will?

We carry out our mission by offering a home environment to HIV+ children that have lost their parents or have been abandoned. We provide basic necessities, education, medicine and opportunities that the children in our care may not have had otherwise. Most importantly we provide a space where they can simply be kids!

### What We Do

Our mission is to continually enhance the quality of life of HIV+ orphaned children and women through education and care in a family-centered environment.

We PROTECT the children and young adults in our care from potential harm by offering them a safe place to live and go to school.

We PROVIDE necessities and opportunities for the children of CHOAIDS to help them lead healthy and meaningful lives.

As our children age, we PREPARE them for life's next steps through education and skill-building so they may have successful transitions into adulthood.

### Here's what we've done in the past year:

- 1. Moved out of our cramped quarters into a more spacious home.
- 2. Hosted our first Board of Directors **strategic planning** meeting at Grace United Methodist Church in Vermilion, OH.
- 3. Steve Hailer of Stow, OH, and Dr. Aimee Simpson of Richland, MI and Roger Skelley-Watts of Vermilion, OH joined the CHOAIDS Board of Directors.
- 4. Created and launched a new hand drawn logo to capture the youthful essence of our organization.
- 5. John Hill (Board Chair) and Hope Walton (Communications Specialist) made their annual visit to the CHOAIDS house in June. Marie Denis Luque (Founder/Executive Director) visited the children in November.
- 6. All 27 school age children switched to a new school.
- 7. Hired our first marketing and communications coordinator for a few hours a week.
- 8. Hosted our first Milwaukee, WI based fundraiser in November and raised \$4,000.
- 9. Built three picnic style multi-purpose benches with the help of volunteers.
- 10. Raised \$23,700 in our first #GivingTuesday fundraising event
- 12. Our friends blessed our children with seven modernized ceiling fans, new bed frames, mattresses, household items and other furniture. For Christmas, they and their churches graced all of our children with presents!

# Welcome to the Family!

Welcome to Joseph (17), Dieudonne (10), and Shely (16)!

Joseph Watson Jirelien came to us by way of an American good Samaritan named Josh McKenna. Joseph had been living on the streets and in a bar before Josh found him and contacted us. Although Joseph is much older than our typical resident, he has been an excellent student and helper at the orphanage. He is excelling at school never before having experienced a structured learning environment and is a joy to behold in our household!

Dieudonne Raymonvil came to us by way of Grace Children's Hospital. Prior to coming to CHOAIDS, she lived with her mother and three sisters. Dieudonne's mother was not tested positive for the virus. Like two-thirds of all births that



take place in Haiti, Dieudonne was born at home. It is possible her infection happened during the birthing process through potentially unsanitary practices, but we do not know for sure.

After her mother's death from AIDS complications, **Shely Wilna Metellus** was taken care of by her neighbor. Shely was treated as a child slave, or *restavec*, in her neighbor's household. The neighbor and his family relocated to the United States leaving Shely with no where else to go. One of the family members contacted us and we were happy to welcome Shely into the CHOAIDS home.

#### Health

In general, our children have been blessed with good health. However, two of our children, two-year-old Edison Ceceron and eleven-year-old Angela Lartigue spent at least 10 days in the hospital. In addition, one of our newest family members, seven-year-old Oscar Prevalus had a tuberculosis (TB) infection resurface which caused him extreme pain and weight loss. As a precautionary measure all the children who share a room with Oscar were placed on TB prophylactic medications.

### **Electricity**

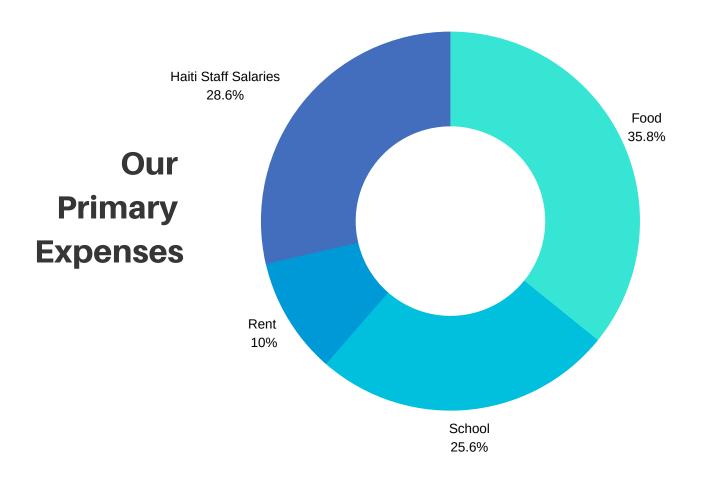
Electricity in Haiti has now become a 4 to 6 hour affair for most people. Our generator is at least six years old and has broken several times over the years. Because of the sporadic nature of electricity it has been difficult for us to manage our refrigerated items such as meats. With support we will be able to purchase a new generator, inverter, and batteries making a wonderful improvement in the lives of our children and staff. We are also working to

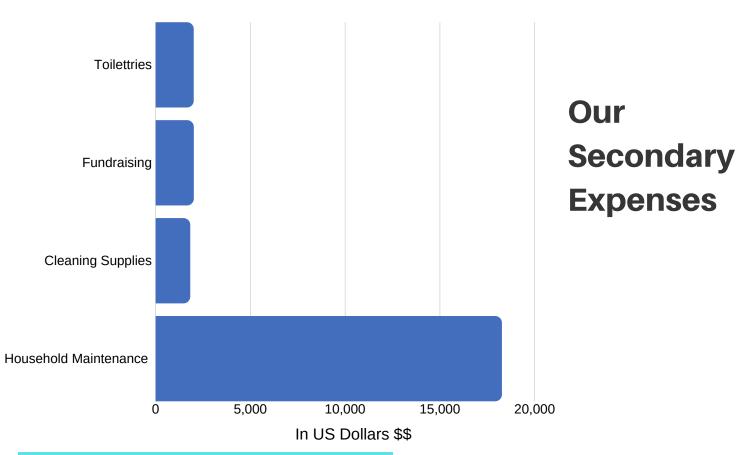


secure a solar operated freezer and a water filter. A water filter will not only save us money in 2019, but offer our children SAFE drinking and cooking water.

#### Travel

With the political protests in Haiti this past year, it has been difficult for our team to safely travel to Port-au-Prince. We hope to continue with our annual trips to bring clothes, vitamins, shoes, hygiene products, other necessities and presents to the children.
